**“Less is more: Precision safeguarding”**

“Safeguarding” can generally be defined as:

- *Verb. Protect from harm or damage with an appropriate measure.*
- *Noun. A measure taken to protect someone or something or to prevent something undesirable.*

**Objectives:**

The 2018 Symposium will explore strategies for dealing with increased plant protection demands in an era of static or declining resources. Within plant protection, there is demand for more tools, to facilitate and support safe, expanding and fast agricultural trade. In the future, we foresee increased international and regional cooperation to develop and implement harmonized, risk-based, and targeted standards, tools and measures to support safe trade in the face of declining or fixed phytosanitary resources worldwide. As such, the 2018 NAPPO Symposium seeks to:

- Examine the concepts of precision agriculture, the safeguarding continuum and precision safeguarding, and engage in a discussion of the advantages and challenges of these approaches;
- Explore how National Plant Protection Organizations (NPPOs) can utilize these approaches and concepts to more effectively target pest risk by considering interventions along the entire plant or plant product pathway;
- Examine how leveraging data and analysis and enhancing the role of industry in risk management can fine-tune the determination of the right effort at the right place for the right outcome or effect in safeguarding;
- Explore opportunities to tailor regulatory (and non-regulatory) approaches to optimize plant protection; and
- Discuss the potential application of these concepts/approaches in the NAPPO region and beyond.
